Signs will be put up to alert school to this. Doors will remain closed.</li> <li>Children are not left with the dog unsupervised.</li> <li>The dog will always be on a lead when she is being walked through the learning environment or around children-playground, assembly, on the gate, etc.</li> <li>The dog will only be taken round classrooms when she is calm enough to do so.</li> <li>The dog will be trained not to jump up or mouth the children.</li> <li>Pupils have been, and continue to be, taught the impact of their actions. Education of this nature is continually given to children, and often to whole school during assemblies and</li> </ul>		n.	

		<ul> <li>The Dogs Trust Charity have visited the children to teach them about suitable behaviour around a dog, how to be safe around dogs and how to treat dogs. This will be repeated biannually or sooner if required</li> <li>Pupils will be taught what to do to prevent the dog from chasing them. (i.e. stand still, cross arms)</li> <li>The dog has undergone formal training (from the age of 12 weeks) with an experienced local trainer. Some pupils will be involved in training (with parental permissions) and along with the schools' primary handlers, continue to reinforce positive training strategies in a controlled area throughout the week.</li> <li>The dog will also undergo conditioning to the school classroom environment, this area of training with allow future reading or nurture intervention to involve the school dog in a calming/therapeutic manner.</li> <li>Risk of scratching and mouthing will reduce and the risk assessment will be review as the dog progresses through her weekly training routine.</li> <li>ALL staff have been introduced to the dog and the expectations (do's and don'ts) of having a school dog which can be found in the School Dog Policy.</li> <li>The dog will attend the vets' regularly to make sure her claws are kept short and that she is in good health. She will be regularly wormed and flea treated.</li> </ul>

The dog gets loose from her crate or from her lead	Child knocked over Child scratched by the dog Child bitten by the dog	<ul> <li>the office.</li> <li>On arrival at the school, the office staff will make visitors aware of the dog and check how they feel about it.</li> <li>The dog will be in her crate during meetings if the visitor is unsure of dogs. Molly is able to be free in the office as long as she is acting calmly and not jumping.</li> <li>The dog's crate &amp; space is big enough for her to be happy and safe during the school day and the children are taught not to tease her.</li> <li>The office is secured with a stair gate and the door will be shut when we need Molly to have restricted contact. When the children are in lessons, the doors between the offices and classrooms will be closed so that Molly has an extended play area outside of the office. Children can come through if they are confident to do so. If they are not, they inform a member of staff who will put Molly away.</li> <li>If the dog does get loose from her safe space (into the classroom area/ or other space with children) the staff will call for a designated staff member who will come and put the dog back in the office.</li> <li>There are designated members of staff who will be called upon in the event of the dog getting loose or if she needs attention at any other time, they are: <ol> <li>Miss Ruth Ardrey (Head Teacher).</li> </ol> </li> </ul>	Now that all staff are familiar with Molly and all are comfortable handling her, anyone is able to act if needed. Dog hair causing allergies	Children/ staff have allergic reaction	<ul> <li>Parents have been asked to inform the school of any known allergies. These will be looked at prior to introduction of the dog to school. A list of any children who should not interact with the dog will be kept on the school recording system and shared with staff. Currently the list is 0.</li> <li>Children will have the opportunity to interact with the dog as they wish and those with allergies will be able to opt out of interaction.</li> <li>Children have been taught to wash their hands after active participation with the dog.</li> </ul>		L

Germs carried by the dog	Children/staff will contract diseases that can be carried by dogs	<ul> <li>Should the dog defecate on the school site a member of staff will clear this up immediately and dispose of it in an outdoor bin. The dog will be trained to toilet in a specific area of the school grounds.</li> <li>All immunisations are kept up to date and the Head Teacher keeps a record of this.</li> <li>Flea treatment is carried out at 4 weekly intervals.</li> <li>Worming treatment is carried out as required.</li> <li>The dog will not go in the school dining hall at meal times; she will not be permitted into the food preparation area of the kitchen.</li> </ul>	L
